Old Testament

Exodus 1:8-2:10

Now a new king arose over Egypt, who did not know Joseph. He said to his people, "Look, the Israelite people are more numerous and more powerful than we. Come, let us deal shrewdly with them, or they will

increase and, in the event of war, join our enemies and fight against us and escape from the land.” Therefore they set taskmasters over them to oppress them with forced labor. They built supply cities, Pithom and Rameses, for Pharaoh. But the more they were oppressed, the more they multiplied and spread, so that the Egyptians came to dread the Israelites. The Egyptians became ruthless in imposing tasks on the Israelites, and made their lives bitter with hard service in mortar and brick and in every kind of field labor. They were ruthless in all the tasks that they imposed on them.

The king of Egypt said to the Hebrew midwives, one of whom was named Shiphrah and the other Puah, “When you act as midwives to the Hebrew women, and see them on the birthstool, if it is a boy, kill him; but if it is a girl, she shall live.” But the midwives feared God; they did not do as the king of Egypt commanded them, but they let the boys live. So the king of Egypt summoned the midwives and said to them, “Why have you done this, and allowed the boys to live?” The midwives said to Pharaoh, “Because the Hebrew women are not like the Egyptian women; for they are vigorous and give birth before the midwife comes to them.” So God dealt well with the midwives; and the people multiplied and became very strong. And because the midwives feared God, he gave them families. Then Pharaoh commanded all his people, “Every boy that is born to the Hebrews you shall throw into the Nile, but you shall let every girl live.”

Now a man from the house of Levi went and married a Levite woman. The woman conceived and bore a son; and when she saw that he was a fine baby, she hid him three months. When she could hide him no longer she got a papyrus basket for him, and plastered it with bitumen and pitch; she put the child in it and placed it among the reeds on the bank of the river. His sister stood at a distance, to see what would happen to him.

The daughter of Pharaoh came down to bathe at the river, while her attendants walked beside the river. She saw the basket among the reeds and sent her maid to bring it. When she opened it, she saw the child. He

was crying, and she took pity on him, “This must be one of the Hebrews’ children,” she said. Then his sister said to Pharaoh’s daughter, “Shall I go and get you a nurse from the Hebrew women to nurse the child for you?” Pharaoh’s daughter said to her, “Yes.” So the girl went and called the child’s mother. Pharaoh’s daughter said to her, “Take this child and nurse it for me, and I will give you your wages.” So the woman took the child and nursed it. When the child grew up, she brought him to Pharaoh’s daughter, and she took him as her son. She named him Moses, “because,” she said, “I drew him out of the water.”

I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven.” Then he sternly ordered the disciples not to tell anyone that he was the Messiah.

Our Gospel lesson finds Jesus and his disciples on a retreat.

Jesus took his followers north of Galilee to a place called Caesarea Philippi, in what would today be Lebanon. It was a beautiful location, near snow-capped Mt. Hebron, a place where rich Romans sought relief from the summer heat.

We do not know why Jesus chose this place, but he did. In this isolated, somewhat strange location, Jesus gave the disciples a

little surprise quiz. You fellows have been milling around among the people. What do you hear them saying about me? Who do they think I am?

In a way it was a terrible moment. None of the disciples seemed eager to respond, out of fear that he might give the wrong answer. They had all experienced the presence of God in Jesus, but no one had the courage to say much more than those blathering comments in our Gospel lesson: Some say you are John the Baptizer ... Elijah or Jeremiah ... or one of the prophets come to life again.

For clarification Jesus changed his question: Who do you say that I am? Then Simon spoke in a confident voice: You are the Messiah, the Son of the Living God!

The response of Jesus was swift. He praised Simon for his insight.

Blessed are you Simon, son of Jonah, for you have not gained this understanding through any human process. You know this because my Father had given you the gift of insight and faith. Blessed are you, Simon, for what you represent. You are a man of stone. It is upon your confession that I will build my Church, my vehicle for carrying the Gospel message to the world, and the gates of hell will not prevail against it.

In this sweeping moment we see the power and importance of a bold confession. We generally associate the word confession with someone admitting to a crime, but the word has a second meaning: “A specific expression of belief in stated articles of faith, such a common faith summary serving as a vehicle for determining those who would belong to a particular group or denomination.”

Long before there was an Apostles’ Creed or the teaching authority of the Pope or the Book of Common Prayer, Peter spoke his faith from his heart. He gave a good confession of his confidence that Jesus Christ was the way, the truth, and the life.

Believing people continue to make good confessions, giving a witness to their faith in Jesus Christ through the way they live in the world. I think it is important for us to remember that. The most significant faith confessions are not made in church or theological seminaries.

The most powerful confessions of faith are made by people like you and me in those unexpected, unguarded moments, when the conversation goes where you never expected it to go.

The reality is, that we are called on to witness every day. If you are a member of this congregation, people have a right to look at us and make a decision about the value of Christianity by what they see in our life. You may be the only sermon some people will

ever hear. But remember: you do not have to have all the answers ... you only need to be open and honest as you struggle to address 21st Century challenges with a faith that has been maturing for over 2,000 years.

Like Peter, we cannot hide. And we must address the two other powerful issues that are set forth in our Gospel lesson: Why is the Church necessary and what is the role of authority for us today, at a time when everyone wants to be his or her own expert insofar as issues of faith are concerned?

Why is the Church important? Obviously, we must live our lives in the midst of many who do not think it is. Like you, I have heard many people say: I don't have much time for organized religion! When I hear that I want to ask ... what is it that intrigues you about disorganized religion?

Others will say ... I am not religious, but I am spiritual. What does that mean? When I hear people say that, I always think what they are really saying is ... I am centered in myself and what brings me joy, meaning and a sense of contentment. I don't need other people unless I determine that there is something, they can do to help me. How sad it is when meditation is seen as a self-help device, a process for achieving inner calm, rather than as a way to empty oneself and get closer to God.

After Peter's powerful declaration of faith, Jesus not only said he would build his Church upon the Rock of his confession, but that he would give to the Church the keys of the kingdom of heaven, implying that the Church would have the ability to shape and control the destiny of people in its care. This is, perhaps, one of the most challenging statements in all of Scripture.

No one likes to submit to an authority. That is why so many politicians run against the Government ... when what they really want is to get control of the Government. We disdain authority that we feel is coercive. We never like to feel forced to do something we do not want to do. And yet Jesus seems to say that there must be an authoritative voice to determine what is in and what is out, what is true and what is false. When alive, Jesus made these calls. With our Lord removed, these critical decisions are entrusted to the Church.

Our Gospel lesson addresses hard issues, but issues that are essential. There was another time when Jesus was in dialogue with the disciples. John's Gospel captures a moment when many seemed to be forsaking Jesus. Jesus turned to the twelve and asked: Do you also wish to go away? Once again, Peter spoke in words that have always captured what I believe: Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God.

And so, remember: It is hard to believe in Jesus Christ; it is harder not to. It is hard to live the life our Lord inspires; it is harder not to. It is hard to belong to the Church; it is harder not to. May our loving God give us the faith and the stamina to live as his sons and daughters, now and always. Amen.
